Curate's Corner - Rev. Coryn Stanforth

Recently, I attended a conference themed around ecological issues and theology. It was an interesting and enjoyable occasion. I love opportunities to learn new things but I left feeling deeply worried.



I wonder if you have come across climate stripes? You can look at them online and they are sometimes used as a design on t-shirts, shopping bags and the like. They look rather like the barcodes found on items in shops and scanned at the till. These stripes are coloured rather than black and it is the colour that is significant.

Each stripe represents the average temperature for a single year, relative to the average temperature over the period as a whole. Shades of blue indicate cooler-than-average years, while red shows years that were hotter than average. The stark band of deep red stripes on the right-hand side of the image show the rapid heating of our planet in recent decades. It is a frightening image. For a number of years, we have heard about an impending climate emergency but now it is no longer something in the future, it has arrived. Our young people often have a far greater understanding and concern for the climate emergency. We should be listening to these fears and concerns.

We hear much about global warming from the media but there are a number of other environmental problems which are just as significant. One is the loss of biodiversity. From 1970 until 2018 there has been a 69% decline of the world's wild animal population. Another issue is that of nitrogen fertilisers which run off agricultural fields into water sources. When the nitrogen gets into the sea it creates areas of algal bloom which causes dead areas in the oceans.

God created our amazing world and gave humankind the responsibility of caring for it. As individuals our actions are small but together, they become more significant. It is also for us, as voters, to lobby our politicians to consider and prioritise ecological issues.

Have a lovely summer but as we enjoy time away from work, holidays and summer weather, let's try and consider small actions that we can all make to care for God's amazing creation.

I Hope to see lots of you at the Tuesday morning summer spaces in Newton Flotman church room.

Summer of 2023 is in full swing! How has it gone so fast is the question many of us ask each other. The answer is simple. Live each day to the full, ensuring we do our best for ourselves and for the community we live and work in. On this note, I move to the topic of the month.

C-Card Scheme and Chlamydia Testing

The Terrence Higgins Trust has a page on its website titled 'Young and Free.' This page gives a detailed explanation of the C-Card system for the 13-24 year olds. As it clearly states 'C-Card is a scheme for young people to access free condoms to improve sexual health. When used correctly during sex, condoms are the only type of protection that help prevent both sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and pregnancy.'

The practice is now set up as a C-Card condom distribution site for young people aged 16-24 years of age. If they are new to the scheme, there is the facility to get a C-Card and a starter pack from any of the clinicians.

The under 16s who already have a C-Card and have consulted with a trained person can also access free condom packs from the practice. The under 16s should have been consulted elsewhere by a trained person. The trained advisor can be found through this link - https://youngandfree.org.uk/

Chlamydia screening has been available freely for some years, for 16-25 year olds. This screening is for people who do not have symptoms. The practice encourages all the clinicians to opportunistically ask the 16-25 year olds if they have been screened in the past year. A free urine test kit is available which the person can then take home and post to the address mentioned on the pack. The results are sent directly to the patient.

As I write this article, I do realise the extreme sensitivity of this topic. Public awareness and education can prevent many conditions.

Enjoy the great summer of 2023!

Flowers, Trees and Butterflies.

In early June the Norfolk Wildlife Trust gave Newton Flotman village some wildflower plug plants to help promote wildflowers on the unmown village green. The trouble was that there were 700 plants and we only had a few days notice!

Happily, Andy Cox was able to mobilise a planting team and the job was done in a couple of hours. It is always a problem getting wild flowers to establish the grass is so dominant it will smother them. To help we planted the wildflowers in carefully strimmed areas to give the flowers a chance.

The next challenge was to keep them watered. Catherine was willing to leave her hose and watering can available and helpers have been watering their favourite plants.

Do have a look for the plants - they are very small at present but hopefully getting bigger. Why not have a go at watering? If you can see to pull the grass away from the plants every little helps!

Last years planting of trees on the green seem to be doing well. We are pleased with their survival after last year's drought. One hornbeam near the Flordon Road looked very sickly in the spring and will probably need replacing this winter.

This year's planting of the avenue of whitebeam on the playing field seem to be doing well. After a dry spell we managed to water these in mid June. (Eight watering cans, two wheelbarrows, four people - two cans full per tree!). We are hoping to mulch them with woodchip if we can.

The copse of trees on the playing field planted during covid are also looking good, with most of them growing above their protective guards.

Big butterfly count

If you can think of sites for tree planting next winter do let us know.

If you enjoy the natural world why not join the Big butterfly count? Find out more by following the link below. You can count where you like - your garden or the village green! The lower part of the churchyard is managed to promote the natural world so that might be a fun place to count butterflies.

Wildlife Jottings

As there's an abundance of life in my garden and out in the front meadow, I always like to keep a diary on what's going on.

Sometimes you'll find juvenile newts in the most unexpected of places, so beware. Froglets, many of which have left the pond, are hiding around the garden. Adult frogs, too, hide in leaf litter under hedges. There are spiders spinning webs amongst pond plants, water boatmen, pond skaters, ramshorn snails, damsel flies, green shield bugs, lots of young damsel fly larvae and other tiny critters. Juvenile bluetits are now feeding themselves, and are joined in the garden by blackbirds, robins, great tits, goldfinches, wrens, dunnocks, pigeons, collared doves, chiffchaff, goldcrests and nuthatches.

There is an abundance of mammalian species in the garden: hedgehog, yellow necked mouse, bank vole, wood mouse and common shrew. Grass snakes have been enjoying the heat of the summer sun.

Smaller species are numerous: solitary bees, bumblebees (mainly buff tailed), gnats and biting midges! There are snails and slugs, green shield bugs, millipedes and earth worms. The wild flowers and nettles have been attracting plenty of butterflies: comma, peacock, holy blue, cabbage white, brimstone meadow brown and gatekeeper.

Ladybird larvae often bamboozle people with black with orange stripes on their body, then a longer tail end. Caterpillars and aphids are everywhere thank heavens for the sparrows and blue tits which keep them at bay! Bats and moths dart around the sky in the evening.

A baking June welcomed repeat-flowering roses and clematis. As much as I love the *Minea Haha* rose, it has to go, as it's not beneficial to pollinators which fly to it but can't land, as it's a double flower. Around the garden there are garlic mustard seed heads, lots of red campion and native geranium cut back to flower again later; marjoram is soon to flower, along with chives, rosemary, sage and mint. Flowering purple loosestrife is covered in bees, as are the lavender, star jasmine, climbing honeysuckle (native and red), as well as yellow shrub honeysuckle.

I thank my neighbour for letting my side of his privet hedge flower. Later it will later will have berries. It was initially left alone as sparrows had a nest until it was raided by the magpies! Salvia, hot lips and sedums are all coming into bud. All the hedges are fabulous and far more beneficial to wildlife if cut in February. The front wildflower meadow is full of grasses galore, with meadow cranesbill, carrot flower, yellow agrimony and a small bramble shrub. Bee orchids appeared in late June, along with lady's bedstraw, clover (red and white), field scabious, thistles, dwarf mallow, and bird's foot trefoil. The ground ivy and seed heads of the cow parsley make good hiding places for insects.

I shall also enjoy doing the BIG BUTTERFLY count on the 17th of July. So sit back and relax and enjoy your gardens, big or small, or look over the garden fence into your neighbours!
