This month we have national awareness weeks dedicated to mental health and eating disorders. Having written about adolescent mental recently, it is only right to discuss the important subject of eating disorders. The prevalence of eating disorders has increased massively in the last 40 years here in the UK and worldwide. Here in the UK, it is known that around 1.25 to 3.4 million people are affected by an eating disorder and around 25% of this number are male. Eating disorders are most common between the ages of 16 and 40. Most of the eating disorders start in the adolescent period.

NICE defines Eating Disorders as a persistent disturbance of eating or eating related behaviour which leads to altered intake or absorption of food and causes significant impairment to health and psychosocial functioning.

The main types are:

- Anorexia nervosa there is an intense fear of gaining weight. There is severe restriction of food intake or persistent behaviour which interferes with weight gain.
- *Bulimia nervosa* recurrent episodes of binge eating followed by compensatory behaviour such as self-induced vomiting, use of laxatives or excessive exercise.
- *Binge eating disorder* recurrent episodes of binge eating in the absence of compensatory behaviours.
- Atypical eating disorders symptoms of anorexia nervosa or bulimia nervosa which do not meet the precise diagnostic criteria. An example is a person who has all the features of anorexia nervosa and has lost significant weight and yet the person's weight is within or above the normal range.

There has been considerable research into eating disorders. It is known that the cause is multifactorial. This can be classed into:

- *Biological factors* family history of eating disorders, changes in the brain or hormone levels
- *Psychological factors* lack of confidence or self-esteem or being a perfectionist

Social factors - bullying, difficulties with school or work or abuse

What help is available:

If you are aware of anyone with eating disorders, encourage the person to approach their GP.

News from Newton Flotman Parish Council

Research Project Report

During the summer of 2021 the parish council undertook research into your concerns about the village and what you felt were the issues that should be addressed by the Parish Council over the next five years. The report has now been published and can be found on the parish council's website or is available in hard copy from the Parish Clerk – contact details below. There were five main recommendations:

- Road safety speed calming measures in Flordon Road, a roundabout at the junction of Flordon Road and the A140 and footpaths on Flordon Road and Church Road. The Parish Council will be working with Highways and will keep you updated with progress.
- Doctor's surgery lobby Long Stratton Medical Partnership to increase the opening times for the surgery in Newton Flotman. The Parish Council has written to the Medical Partnership and will use every opportunity it has to influence those who make the decisions regarding this.
- Youth services and facilities/playing field the Parish Council will be working with the YMCA to provide a youth club in the village and, in conjunction with the Village Centre committee, is looking at equipment for older children such as a skateboard park and BMX track.
- Volunteering and communication improve the communication with residents and make residents more aware of the volunteering opportunities available. The Parish Council already has a website and Facebook page (if you haven't liked our page please do so), they will also be establishing a database of email addresses for those who are interested in receiving notifications that way.
- Regular surveys of the residents in the village the Parish Council will be surveying the village regularly with a maximum interval of 5 years to ensure that they continue to understand the wants and needs of the village and can implement suitable policies to meet them.

Budget and Precept

At the beginning of January, the Parish Council met to consider its budget for 2022-23 and to set the precept – the amount of money to the taken from the residents of the village as part of the council tax. There were some very difficult decisions to make and councillors struggled between not wanting to put additional financial burden on residents at what is understandably a very difficult time for some and needing to secure additional funds to allow the Council to undertake some of the recommendations from the research as detailed above and to assist the Village Centre Committee. Urgent work is needed at the Village Centre and Playing Field that the Village Centre Committee are unable to afford themselves, including some ditch clearance work, cutting back of trees and hedges and maintenance of the play equipment, which, if not carried out, will mean the closure of some of the equipment. careful consideration, it was agreed to increase the precept from £12,298 to £23,418 to allow the necessary finances to pay for the items detailed above. This will result in an increase on the council tax demand of 89%. However, when broken down into real terms, for a band D property the increase will equate to £2.03 per month or 47p per week. The Parish Council are well aware of how high this increase is, but hope that residents will understand that it is a relatively small price to pay for the services that are required.

By the time you read this, comments will have been submitted and the deadline for submission will have passed. South Norfolk Council will determine the application and you will be able to track its progress, as well as seeing all comments submitted, including the Parish Council's, on its website. The planning application number is 2021/2784.
