The Patient Participation Group met on Monday 17th February to discuss our next health education evening. The intention is that we will focus on the subject of "Heart Health," building on our Diabetes session held last year. We haven't settled on a date yet, but it will be during the spring (hopefully before Easter depending on venue availability).

This event ties in nicely with the recent news coverage about young people and heart health awareness as per a recent article on the BBC News (Tuesday 4th February – which you can watch on iPlayer).

Heart health affects everyone, no matter what age, and taking small steps to make lifestyle changes can dramatically improve your life. Your heart is a muscle that requires exercise and care, just as much as any other muscle!

The intention will be to have guest speakers from a range of services present: the British Heart Foundation; a consultant from the cardiology team at the Norfolk & Norwich and hopefully someone from a sport and nutrition background. The aim of the evening will be to help patients understand some of the more complex, but increasingly common terminology. We hope to dispel some myths and to open conversations about ways that you can take power over your own health. We will look to explore the complex world of cholesterol and statins, and have some dietary advice about balanced eating habits.

Please keep an eye open on Facebook, on the Parish Magazines, and on our TV in the waiting room. We really do want as many of you as possible to be involved – because this is an important issue which affects us all.

Newton Flotman Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group



The revised version of the **Newton Flotman Neighbourhood Plan** was submitted to South Norfolk District Council in early February. Newton Flotman Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers on the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, supported by Rachel Leggett and Associates.

Neighbourhood plan

South Norfolk District Council have informed us that the Neighbourhood Plan will now go through the following stages:

1. Checking documents against criteria for submitted Neighbourhood Plans, within the Localism Act (requires Portfolio Holder approval)

2. Assuming there are no issues with stage 1, undertaking a six week period of public consultation on the submitted plan (Reg. 16 consultation)

3. Commissioning an independent examination of the submitted plan

4. Decision on examiner's recommendations and decision on whether to proceed to referendum (requires Portfolio Holder approval)

5. Assuming there are no issues at stage 4, holding a referendum within the parish

6. Adoption of the Neighbourhood Plan

We have been told that this could take 7 months to complete.

We will keep you informed of progress with South Norfolk Council's consultation, the independent examination and then the referendum.

A Word From Rosedale

For some, the beginning of a new year can be a good time to make changes in life. A new year brings the possibility of a fresh start. Many people commit to new fitness or dietary goals or reassess career direction. In January, estate agents report a surge of properties coming onto the market as people decide to make changes to their living arrangements.

On a smaller scale, I like to take stock of my bookshelves, kitchen cupboards and wardrobe. There is something therapeutic about re-organising our personal space and clearing out things that are surplus to requirements. It feels good to donate clothes and books to charity shops, knowing that someone else can benefit from things we no longer need, whilst also making money for worthy causes. This form of recycling is also good for the planet.

For those who are bereaved, a new year is often **not** a cause for celebration but a reminder that the future must be faced without their loved one. For some, this fear can be quite overwhelming.

At our bereavement groups, we like to remind participants that they do still have a future (even though it might look very different to what they had planned.) None of us know the future or what good times may lie ahead.

We also remind our participants that they are still individuals of worth (even without their loved one) and they are still important - friends, family, colleagues etc, still need them.

No matter our circumstances, we all have something to offer. We each have a unique set of skills, characteristics and abilities that are needed in the world.

Most importantly, we all need to be reminded that we are not alone. Everyone is part of some kind of community, whether that be a family, a friendship group, neighbourhood, church, workplace or hobby club. At the most basic level, we are all part of the human race and have a part to play in making the world a better place.

I'll finish with a little story...Whilst looking at some of the comments beneath an Instagram post about mental health, a doctor had commented that he was losing hope and didn't feel his life had a point anymore. I encouraged him to keep going and that I believed he had a unique combination of skills and abilities that no one else had. I reminded him that the world needed what he had to give. He replied with 'Thank you, I really needed to hear this today.'

We don't know what difficult situations someone else might be facing but we

can all do a little something that might make a big difference - a smile, a helping hand, a kind word, or an act of generosity.
