The Bells of St Peter's Swainsthorpe



As some will know we have been raising funds to restore the four 17th century bells of St Peter's to working condition. The bells were originally hung for full circle ringing but many years ago the wheels, ropes and pulleys fell into decay and it was only possible to chime one bell with a simple chiming clapper. Sadly, the tower is no longer strong enough to withstand the movement of the four bells in full circle ringing unless we install a

new hanging frame which would be both very expensive and not in keeping with the ancient church tower.

The PCC, therefore, decided that a more sympathetic restoration to allow the bells to be chimed, would be more appropriate. This will involve rehanging the bells for stationary chiming and installing chiming mechanisms. We would like to install both a manual, Ellacombe chiming system and an electronic chiming system, as this latter would allow the bells to be chimed automatically for events such as weddings. However, the cost of these works will be approximately £25,000 +VAT.

The FIGS group, the PCC and the church congregation have been raising funds for several years, so far raising £9,300. I am very pleased to report that yesterday we also received a grant from the BENEFACT TRUST for £1,750 which brings our total to just over £11,000.

We will continue raising funds for this project with social events and by seeking further grants in the hope to be able to commence work in 2024. Any

donations from the community will be very welcome.

Newton Flotman Climate Care

Road transport releases about one third of UK CO_2 emissions. Emissions from transport need to drop - and quickly if we are to minimise global warming. Some of this depends on technology advances and on government policy, but there are things we can all do to reduce our personal carbon footprint.



So here are some things to think about:

- Think before you drive. Could you walk . . .or cycle?? By the time you have paid to park, might it be cheaper and easier to catch the bus?
- Plan your car use. Can you combine trips maybe go to the supermarket on your way to visit friends rather than two separate trips?
- What about car sharing? This is easily arranged if you are all traveling to the same place - we always try to car share on our way to the monthly village local walk. There are car share websites which look pretty distant and daunting. Perhaps we should have a village car share scheme?
- Change your driving style. This can save you lots of fuel very welcome with petrol at £1.50 per litre. Accelerate more gently and cruise at lower speeds. Full details of economic driving are on the RAC website Keep your car well maintained especially checking the tyre pressure.

So what about an electric car? A car that emits no greenhouse gas as it goes along sounds like a brilliant step forward...but there have been criticisms. So I have looked into this in a bit more detail and here are some thoughts:

- *It takes more greenhouse gas emissions to build an electric car.* True, but as it emits none as it goes along, by the time it's done 10 20,000 miles it's winning on emissions.
- *Worries about range and charging.* Again true but improving all the time. More public chargers and faster charging.
- *Immoral and abusive supply chains for battery chemicals.* This needs fixing. Some manufacturers are already ensuring their chemicals come from reputable mining companies. Battery chemicals will be recycled. Worries about the origins of battery chemicals does not seem to stop us buying mobile phones!
- A fire risk. Car fires seem to be much **less** common in electric cars than in petrol or diesel.
- *Electric cars are heavy leading to more tyre wear and brake wear as well as damaging the roads.* Tyre and brake wear can be reduced by careful driving as above. National highways say most road damage is caused by heavy lorries not cars.

As you can tell I think electric cars are the way forward - especially as they get better all the time. But I'm not rushing to buy one. Best to keep my existing car carefully driven until I really need to change - then go electric.

News from Newton Flotman Parish Council Annual Parish Meeting

The Parish Council hosted the Annual Parish Meeting on 30th April. Local groups were invited to attend and share updates of their achievements last year, any difficulties they have faced and their objectives for the forthcoming year. It was great to hear more from these groups and what they are doing in the village. The next meeting will be held in April 2025, look out for more information in Partnership and on the noticeboards next spring.

Youth Club Funding

The Parish Council are pleased to announce that funding has been secured towards the youth club at the Village Centre. This financial year the Parish Council have again pledged to fund 50% of the running costs of the youth club. Funding has been sought to make up the shortfall which has proved more difficult than previous years as the funds available are reducing but the demand for this money is increasing. This funding from Norfolk Community Foundation, **Love Norfolk Fund 2024 with support from the Birketts Fund,** means the club will be running Wednesday evenings though to April 2025.

D Day Celebrations

REMINDER! - June 6th marks the 80th anniversary of D Day when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. 4,000 ships and landing craft set down about 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe from Nazi occupation.

Newton Flotman is marking this occasion by lighting a beacon at 9.15pm on the playing field beside the Village Hall in celebration of the 'light of peace' that emerged out of the darkness of war. Come along and enjoy the celebrations from 7pm at the village centre.

Hornsea Three Offshore Windfarm Project

The Hornsea Three wind farm received development consent in December 2020. Hornsea Three, once complete, could provide clean power to over three million UK homes. It will make a significant contribution towards meeting the UK's net zero commitments and Orsted are committed to working closely with stakeholders and local communities as they take the project forward.

The Stakeholder & Community Relations Team for the onshore cable installation works has a key objective to deliver effective engagement to local stakeholders and communities in areas in which they construct and operate. As a key stakeholder, they would like to ensure villages such as Newton Flotman have visibility of their works.

A representative will be attending the Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 25th June at the Village Centre from 7:30pm. They will give a short presentation on the project. June $\vec{6}^{th}$ marks the 80th anniversary of D Day when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. 4,000 ships and landing craft set down about 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe from Nazi occupation.

Newton Flotman is marking this occasion by **lighting a beacon at 9.15pm** on the playing field beside the Village Hall in celebration of the 'light of peace' that emerged out of the darkness of war.

To celebrate D-Day 80, we are going to provide fish and chips in the Village Hall from 7.00pm as it is also National Fish & Chip Day. Fish and chips were the only food that was not rationed during the two world wars, and, to celebrate that fact we are going to have a fish supper in the village hall before the beacon lighting event.



Gardening in June - Royal Horticultural Society Summer arrives

June 21st is the longest day of the year, and the extra light and warmth encourages the garden to put on an exuberant burst of growth. But this extra light and warmth also means weeds will sprout up from seemingly nowhere. Keep on top of them by hoeing regularly in dry conditions.

Top gardening jobs this month

Position summer hanging baskets and containers outside

Choose vibrant bedding plants for a short-term show or herbs, shrubs and evergreens for a long-lasting display.

Be water-wise, especially in drought-affected areas

Watering is key to growing plants well. Connect water butts to your downpipes, and when they are full, decant into dipping troughs positioned around the garden. Use a watering can and water at the base of plants early in the morning or later in the evening.

Pinch out sideshoots on tomatoes

Removing the side-shoots is simple – every time you water, check the plant for any shoots sprouting just above each leaf, from the joint between the leaf and the stem.

Harvest lettuce, radish, other salads and early potatoes

Produce your own mixed salads by growing a range of leafy salads and vegetables that can be cut and will then sprout (come) again. Harvesting the young leaves when you need them prevents plants from maturing and ensures several harvests of small, tender, mild-flavoured leaves over a long period of time.

Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds. Weeds can be controlled without resorting to weedkillers. Cultural or organic control measures rely on killing or restricting the weeds by physical action, from manual removal to smothering, burning and using weed barriers.

Plant out summer bedding

From elaborate public garden designs and street planters to the smallest front garden, bedding plants provide a temporary decorative seasonal display for beds, borders, containers and hanging baskets. Bedding can be grown from seed, bought as young seedlings (plug plants) or purchased as pot-grown specimens, often in multi-packs and cellular trays, ready for planting.

Stake tall or floppy plants

Perennials in borders often put on strong lush growth that makes them vulnerable to collapse, especially after heavy rain or strong winds. Staking them early in the season will help avoid disaster. In particular; tall plants and hybrids with large flowers require additional support.

Prune many spring-flowering shrubs

Deciduous shrubs that flower in late winter, spring and early summer need annual pruning to encourage strong, healthy shoots and improve flowering. Annual pruning also prolongs the life of these early-flowering shrubs.
