Team Vicar's Page

In the weeks that followed the historic 80th anniversary of the Normandy landing, I am very pleased to be able to have spent a lot of time watching a number of films and series that dealt with D-Day and the fight to liberate Europe from Nazis.

Like me, many of us, I know, will have watched the celebrations of the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings with great interest. It was truly a turning point in history. Most of us are too young to remember it; few of us had any real insight into what those gallant servicemen faced, or really understood the cost at which our liberty was preserved.

Can it be that now we will value our freedom more? Those men landing on the Normandy beaches were fighting to drive back a terrible tyranny which threatened to engulf the world, and it was deeply moving to see the profound honour in which so many young French people hold the veterans who liberated their parents and grandparents from the Nazi occupation.

Freedom is a precious thing never to be taken for granted. Fortunately, many in Britain may have not known the horror of occupation by enemy forces with an alien outlook on our lives just like the people in Gaza and Ukraine are experiencing today.

We have always been able to say what we think, to express religious and political opinions, to associate freely and to protest against political and social changes of which we do not approve.

Watching the films of the D-day landings and listening to the memories of those who were there shows us the price that others paid for our freedom. So, let's value it and honour it, and do everything we can to preserve it; there could be no better way to honour their memory and the sacrifice they made. For it is in freedom that human beings attain their highest potential, and in defending it that they show their noblest characteristics.

Thinking of all this makes me think of the freedom that God has provided for us through Jesus Christ (Galatians 5:13). The freedom to live in love, not hate, live in peace, not war and live in unity, and not disunity. So, as we honour the dead of our wars, may God grant that we may preserve and respect our freedom in peace time so that we never again have to resort to war to defend or reclaim it.

Newton Flotman Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

The Newton Flotman Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has been working over the last few months to develop the Neighbourhood Plan for Newton Flotman. The Newton Flotman Neighbourhood Plan is a planning policy document

Neighbourhood plan

written by the community to guide future development in the area over the next 20 years.

We have been collecting information to give us evidence that will help us to create suitable policies for the village. The information has been collected from three sources:

- 1. The Household Survey, which we distributed in March and April and received your opinions about the village. The results have been put together in a report.
- 2. A data profile which one of our consultants has produced for us and contains a broad range of information about the village.
- 3. A Housing Needs Assessment undertaken by AECOM which identified the types of housing the village will need over the next twenty years given the predicted demographic trends over this time period. It has also highlighted the issue for 'can rent, can't buy' households who are able to afford to rent privately but cannot afford home ownership.

These reports are available to read on the Neighbourhood Plan section of the Parish Council website www.newtonflotmanpc.co.uk/neighbourhoodplan. You can also view the agendas and minutes of the meetings on this website.

Over the next two months we will be drafting planning policies. Once this is complete and we have a draft Neighbourhood Plan, we will be asking for your feedback. Please look out for details about this next stage in our consultation process.

Newton Flotman Climate Care

We are happy to say that our local church, St Mary's in Newton Flotman, has achieved a silver A Rocha Ecochurch award, and I thought it would be good to explain a bit about what this means.



A Rocha UK is a Christian charity working to protect and restore the natural world. They run an 'ecochurch' scheme

to equip churches of all denominations to care for creation. As churches follow the guidance and use the resources they can receive Bronze Silver or even Gold awards.

The challenges for the awards fall into 5 areas - so here are some of the things St Mary's has done to get a silver award:

Worship and teaching: We pray for the natural world at all of our weekly services. We have regular climate theme services. Care for creation is regularly covered in our teaching.

Buildings: This is a challenging area for us. The church building does not lend itself to double glazing or cavity wall insulation. Nevertheless we do what we can. Our electricity is from a sustainable provider. We use low energy light bulbs. We minimise power and heating use where possible.

Land: Part of our church land is managed to promote wildlife. Under guidance from the Norfolk Wildlife trust this area grows long grass and wild flowers in the summer. There is a bird bath for birds and a bug hotel for insects. We are planning nest boxes for next season.

Community engagement: We share information and advice on climate related matters in this magazine and on the village Facebook page. We have a tree planting group and a local walks group - getting out into the natural world. There is a community allotment - really local food! We have a WhatsApp group to share climate related matters. We work with the parish council on ecological matters. We lobby our elected representatives pushing climate related themes.

Lifestyle: A difficult area this! We know that some parts of our lifestyles are not sustainable. As society we need to eat less meat, use less petrol in our cars and less gas to heat our homes. We need to fly less. As a church we promote changes in our lives whilst understanding that these changes present real challenges in different ways for different people.

As you can see there is quite a lot to it - and this is only a brief summary of a complex survey.

If you are interested in climate related matters you would be welcome to join our WhatsApp group or receive a monthly email update. You are also welcome to join the community allotment team or come on a local walk. Just let me know.

Highways and village issues - who does what?

There are many different organisations that play various roles in the village and beyond.

Highways issues are dealt with by Norfolk County Council and can be reported on their website **www.norfolk.gov.uk** It is possible to report issues to the highway such as potholes and overgrown verges and hedges. You can also read the Norfolk Speed Management Strategy on the website.

The Parish Council maintains the Village Green which is carefully managed to encourage wildlife but still allowing access by foot across the green. The access to the river at Joy Avenue is also maintained by the Parish Council; the grass is cut here monthly and the undergrowth cut twice a year.

The playing field and play area at the Village Centre are maintained by the Village Centre with support from the Parish Council.

Other grass verges in to the village are maintained by either Norfolk County Council or housing associations. Unfortunately, despite trying to make contact, it has not been possible to obtain the cutting schedules for these areas. Concerns regarding these need to be addressed directly with Norfolk County Council or the housing association.

- 1. Continue developing the Neighbourhood Plan
- 2. Seek to recruit two more Councillors to meet the full allocation of Councillors

Newton Flotman Broadband Relief as Village Connected

Broadband relief for 1,600 rural residents and business owners in Newton Flotman is on the horizon as engineers begin to provide properties in the village with a full fibre connection.

Work to connect the village, and the surrounding communities of Tasburgh, Hempnall, Saxlingham Thorpe and Saxlingham Nethergate began in November when engineers from telecoms company Gigaclear began extending its network from the nearby village of Long Stratton using fibre optic cables.



With the cable connection between the two communities now live, engineers are in the process of taking the network to almost 1,600 properties either by digging new trenches or using existing infrastructure such as poles and ducting.

The majority of homes and businesses are expected to have access by the end of the year.

Senior Project Manager Ben Robertson said Gigaclear was working hard to ensure rural, often hard to reach communities such as Newton Flotman and Long Stratton were able to access the same fast and reliable full fibre broadband enjoyed by larger urban areas. He said: "We've already cabled to around 400 properties in the village and we'll be completing the remainder over the next six months.

"Taking our full fibre to rural communities that would otherwise have copper or an inferior broadband connection fundamentally changes them for the better because it creates choice for the people in those communities about how they work and how they live their lives."

I am writing this whilst sitting in a high rise building in London this weekend, just enjoying the sights. We have had a weekend away, just my husband and myself, and it is has been really lovely just to walk around London and visit a museum. One is really made aware that you do not have to travel abroad; there is so much to see here in England. However, this is not the topic from me this month.

As this parish magazine comes to you it will be July 2024, and we will be in the middle of summer. The 1st to 7th of July is Alcohol Awareness Week. What is alcohol awareness? It is one where we are educated about alcohol and the safe use and if needed to change our drinking habits. This has been especially brought about by Alcohol Change UK that run this awareness week campaign every year.

This year we are given some statistics about the use of alcohol in the UK. It is quite a scary figure that Alcohol Change mentions on its website. There are an estimated 602,391 dependent drinkers, and it is said only 18% of this population are receiving treatment.

Now what is the problem with excessive alcohol use? Of course, we know it is a problem and most people are aware of liver cirrhosis, but this is not the only problem - it is only one of the many, many problems that excessive alcohol misuse can lead to. Cancer is of course the top of the list. This includes mouth, throat, stomach, liver and breast cancers, of course many other cancers are associated with excessive alcohol use, but these particularly. Excessive use can also cause high blood pressure and depression. One does wonder how many of these people will be admitted to hospital. It is said that in 2019/20 there were just under a million hospital admissions related to alcohol consumption, this is 12% higher than the admission rate in 2016/17.

One of the other associated problems is crime. In 2018/19 39% of people living in England were said to have witnessed some kind of anti-social behaviour in their local area, and 11% of this was alcohol related.

We should touch on the influence of alcohol on youngsters too. The figures from 2018 show that in England 44% of pupils aged 11-15 reported having drunk alcohol at some point, 14% of the 11-year-olds reported having drunk an alcoholic drink compared to 70% of the 15-year-olds. 6% of these pupils said that they drank alcohol at least once a week and by the time you get to 15 this went up to 14%.

Of course, alcohol is not all completely bad, and how I have always told my patients in consultations is that it is something that we control, and we should never allow alcohol to control us, or our lives, and that's the balance we need to find. So, it is important to know what the safe limits of drinking alcohol in this country are. Years ago we had a figure that said 28 units per week, however, in the last few years this has come down to 14 units for both men and women. Of course, a safe limit of 14 units does not mean that we should drink 14 units a week; it is saying what the upper limit is.
